




GREETINGS FROM THE HEADQUARTERS

If you consider our past MPC reps, (Dick Sanders, Chuck Harrison and Dan Morgan) I'd be willing to bet Bill moved more people and influenced more lives than all of them combined. If I had the time, space, and memory to include all of his accomplishments, I certainly would. If I did, he'd probably end up in jail. Before I came to AMC, I really didn't think it was possible for there to be 2 load masters of this caliber. We are very fortunate to have Gary come to us from the C-17 program.

Well, that brings you up to speed with the people here at Scott. Here's a little news about what's going on in the career field. As you probably know, we have been in the midst of a draw down over the last 3 years. It's finally over. School house production is back in full swing and, hopefully, our manning will improve over the next year. We ended up getting shorter than planned, but with our accessions we will be OK. If you know anybody interested in coming into the field; we are open for cross training. Target grades are Techs and Staffs, but a Senior Airman with less than 7 years can apply. They need to see the retraining office at the MPF. Encourage the good ones to apply.

The mass PCS moves as a result of BRAC are finally complete. The KC-10's and Altus guys have pretty much borne the brunt this year. The McDill rumor should happen this next fiscal year, however, the impact to the vast majority of people will be minimal. We will be looking for 15 people for the KC-10 during the year. The drawdown has really hurt our ability to recruit and cross flow people. As a result, we have ended up short, especially at McGuire. If you're interested in making a move, give us a call, or check the Equal Plus ad in your orderly room. The only other big requirement we will be looking for is volunteers for the Schoolhouse. Instructor duty is still the most important job you can volunteer for. When you're ready for some stability, want to work on your education, and most importantly train-students, step up to the plate and give Altus a shot. The location isn't California, but you'd be working with some of the best booms the schoolhouse has ever seen. We will work with MPC for time on station waivers for either of these programs.

Finally, this has been an extremely busy year for everyone. The common theme you get from reading the inputs is nobody has been spared. We wish we could tell you it's going to get better, but we don't know if it will. Seems as soon as one fire gets put out, another one crops up. We can only tell you to keep pressing ahead, do the best you can, and be smart in your decisions. We know you guys in the trenches scratch your heads and wonder if anyone above the crew line

has a clue. Every time someone makes a decision that we get a cut on, the first thing we do is try to look at it from your perspective. It doesn't always float, but we continue to try.

Most of the inputs in this Signal end with something like "If you're ever in the area, stop by for a". We'll continue with that tradition and set out the welcome mat here at Scott. If you're in the area, either officially or unofficially, give us a call. We're confident in saying no one in this building is ever so busy they can't take time to meet up with a visiting boom operator. Just pick up the phone and let us know you're here. Fly Safe!

1. It's hard to believe that another year has gone by since our last input. Thanks up front to Scott Harris and Jake Benscooter for taking the lead on this document once again. Their diligence and patience gives us something that is both entertaining and informative.


2. AETC is still up and running! Several key issues have been worked by Ted Carrier and myself over the past year and we would like to give you an update. General McPeak's (Who) Year-of-Training initiatives proposed that all career fields have CDC's and a formal 7-level in-residence school. We (Altus Msgt Jeff Reuter) are in the process of writing the 5-level CDC's, but we will not have 7-level CDC's or a formal 7-level school. We some how managed to convince the powers to be that enlisted aircrew received plenty of training and their was no need to develop a formal school for 7-level upgrade. Now for even better news, we have once again opened the career field to cross-trainees and basic trainees. You are probably all ready seeing some of the basic trainees arriving in your squadrons and can expect to see a few cross-trainees over the next year. The 96 PFT which started in June of 95 has approximately 90 basic trainees and 25 cross trainees scheduled to attend training. We are planning on full classes for the 97 and 98 PFT's also, so for those of you that are short on manning we are working hard to produce booms for you as fast as we can. We are also working on reducing the amount of time it takes to train a boom operator at CCTS. We have reduced the academic and simulator time and are planning to refolw the flight line portion for the 97 PFT. We need your help to make sure that the quality of training does not suffer. Please take the time to give good constructive feedback on your critique sheets of your CCTS students. If you don't or haven't received a feedback form please take the initiative to get one. We need your help to help us produce a product that is useful to you. If you have any comments about the quality of students please feel free to call Ted or myself (DSN 487-4463) any time, and we mean that sincerely. Another change to CCTS is the fact that we will be producing boom operators fully qualified in cargo loading operations around the first of 1997. We expect to have a full scale cargo loading trainer housed in a very nice building to conduct this training and you should start seeing these students arriving at your units around spring of 97. Once again, take the time to give us some feedback on your new

booms. On the international note: those of you that participate in operations in and around Turkish airspace may see some KC-135R's with some strange markings and speaking a strange language. We have trained 3 Turkish crews and expect approximately 4 more crews to go through initial qual at Altus within the next 2 years. AETC has provided mobile training teams to Incirlick and is conducting follow-on training for the Turkish crews.

- 3. Now for what's happening with the AETC Staff "Weenies", we have 2 positions here at Randolph AFB in San Antonio Texas, 1 position at the Headquarters (policy, programming, and weenie stuff) which I fill, and 1 position at 19AF (DOV, he really is there to help) which Ted fills. We are in the process of converting an officer position at the 619th training squadron, also here at Randolph. The 619th position will be responsible for syllabus oversight of all initial qualification training courses at Altus, I expect that position to be a Msgt slot, (it will be a flying slot). We have 1 slot at EAUC at Sheppard AFB Texas. That slot is responsible for screening our basic trainees before we spend big bucks to qualify them. I expect to get another position for a boom there by the time you read this letter. And then we have the men and women of Altus AFB OK. We are always looking for high quality people to fill any of these positions, especially at Altus. If any of you are interested we would be happy to talk to you about, and offer excellent educational opportunities, quality family time, and almost zero TDY.
- 4. Stop in and see us when you get to Texas. We have lots to drink and lots to do. My number is DSN 487-4463, and Ted's number is 487-6422.

Greetings again from your friendly Stan/Eval Booms here at Travis AFB, CA. It's been pretty busy for us here over the last year and many of you folks have seen us once or twice, (especially on the west coast). There has been no change in personnel in the last year, we still have Jim Eden (KC-135 active), Michael Wetzel (KC-135 ARC), and Mike Paynter (KC-10 active).

On the KC-135 side we have seen many changes taking place with many more on the horizon. We finally have a new -9 that has many new items of interest incorporated that will hopefully take some of the guess work out of the loading/unloading operation. Get to know your -9, remember you are the last line of defense for cargo that may not belong on the -135. Don't rely on that aerial port troop for insuring all restrictions are met. 1. Hello to all from HQ 21AF/DOV. As some of you may know, Denny Brown has retired to the highways of upstate New York. So all of you planning to drive through New York, keep your eyes peeled for "Officer Brown". The new guys at 21 AF are:

<u>SMSgt Lee Winter</u> I was tired of wearing BDUs and visiting exotic places like Camp Lejune, Mombassa, and Roswell. Seriously, let me put a plug in for the AMOS..It was a good job with a lot of responsibility and I recommend it to anyone looking for new horizons. I arrived here in DOV one day before the Selfridge ASEV and have been in afterburner ever since. I'm assigned to the Flight Standards Branch (Phone - DSN440-2229).

<u>SMSgt Dave Hetrick</u> Dave is our Guard Guy. He arrived here from Phoenix in January, and has been TDY ever since. Yeah, it's colder here, but it's a dry cold. Dave is assigned to Flight Standards Branch (Phone - DSN440-3452).

CRM is one of the strongest areas we have noticed. Keep it up. Two areas we noticed that need some attention are the cargo and loose equipment step of the checklist. Establish a logical and methodical pattern of looking for loose equipment and do it every time. The other area is checklist usage. Some of you are not carrying the checklist with you and referring to it as necessary. This is a poor practice and violates AFI 11-215. Also, we see a lot of deviations that are premeditated. By this I mean, you made a conscious decision to deviate because your way is better. First, this is still a deviation, and second, if you have found a better way, submit an 847 so you can share your idea with the rest of us.

- 3. What's new for the future? AMC has directed a NAF no-notice program, and 21 AF has implemented this directive. We plan to do our no-notices on AMC Channel Missions to the best of our ability. We do hoowever, reserve the right to show up home station. Plan on seeing one of us on each Atlantic Express and Guard Mission to Lajas, and you'll do well.
- 4. If you have any questions or just want to shoot the bull, feel free to call us. We'll see you in the system, and during Pyramid Evaluations.

Greetings from DET 1, AMCAOS (KC-10 Contractor Training Oversight Office) Here in beautiful downtown Irving, Texas. We have quite a bit going on in the KC-10 training world.

The BOT from Barksdale AFB moved to McGuire last December, the Seymour Johnson BOT is sitting in the Link factory in Binghampton, NY, waiting for modification, and the March AFB BOT will be shutting down on Sep 15, and moving up to Travis. It will be ready for training 15 November.

A few months ago, CAE sold their Link Training Division to Hughes Training Inc. The KC-10 training program is now HTI-Link. The changeover was transparent to the Air Force, just the name on the wall changed, again. The current KC-10 contract is up in October, 1996, but Air Force contracting is attempting to get an extension to the contract to allow Link to finish some major projects they are working on.

The major projects include making all courseware Computer Based, and eliminating the sound-slide programs. During this, the initial qual courses are all being rewritten, to make them more comprehensive. This will trickle down to the Instructor and refresher courses as well. We should have a turn-on to modify the first BOT by this week. The BOT will have a brand new computer installed, a new control loading system for the flight control stick, a new instructor station, and, finally, a new, state of the art computer generated graphic visual. This will not be like the current KC-135 BOPTT visual. We will be getting a system that will generate dynamic boom and receiver aircraft with dynamic shadowing, moveable light patterns, (nozzle light) realistic boom flexing and oscillation, and realistic shading and texturing. The window will have a format of almost 3 million pixels, of which 2 million will be in an 11"X 15" high resolution inset. The resolution in the inset will! be better than 3.7 arc minutes per optical line pair. This means we will be able to identify the octagonal head of a 3/4" bolt at 60 feet. Additionally, we will have a head tracker installed, so when you move your head around, the overall scene and perspective and motion parallax will be correct. This will allow you, for instance, to move your head and see what's behind the boom. This will give the boom operator a realistic multi-dimensional looking image for refueling.

The first BOT modified should be installed at Travis 14 months from now. The McGuire BOT should be finished six months later.

Another thing in progress is the KC-10 Boom Operator Passenger handling, emergency egress course contracted with AMR (American Airlines). The idea is to send 25 KC-10 boomers to this course, and use the information to rewrite our EEET course. For you "Sit down, shut up, and keep your feet off the seats," types, this

seems a waste of time, but, with the AMC emphasis on passenger hauling, a cirriculum including: Passenger evacuation hands on drills, incident reviews, handling sabotage and hijacking situations, and an emergency medical workshop will give us much useful information, and possibly save a life someday.

That's all for now in the KC-10 training world. If you have any questions or comments, give me a call.



Greetings to All!





What a difference a year makes. Last year there were three KC-10 MOBs. This year there are two, neither existing as of the last Signal input. Our home is now McGuire AFB, NJ and once all is said and done, I think this place will work just fine. Like so many people in today's Air Force we've experienced enough change to last us well into the 21st century, and it isn't over yet. This KC-10 squadron is in an interim location inside the big hangar while the permanent squadron building is under construction (ETC late 1997). Ops Group, Base Ops, Control Tower, a new KC-10 Hangar, the list of work sites here goes on and on.

The biggest obstacle to overcome has been the Quagmire McGuire attitude. The arrival of new aircraft (us) to the base has had a positive effect in that lots of money is being spent to put McGuire back on line after having been seen for too many years as a BRAC target. We're here, folks, and we're not going away. The majority of personnel are in place and we're doing business, so let me fill you in on the 2nd.

Right after we arrived here we were tasked to get the Joint Task Force Command and Control Module (JTF/CCM or "Silver Bullet") bedded down and ready for use. This is a thirty-six foot Airstream trailer cut into three twelve-foot sections on airdrop pallets. The concept of the module is to get key personnel to hot spots in the world quickly and have them ready to go when they get there, and this is just the thing to do it. Once at the operating location, the module can be taken from the aircraft and set up in an austere location and serve as a command center. We took the module out on an operational test last fall and had just gotten it home when we were tasked to move our senior theater commanders to the desert as things looked like they might get serious again. The module is centerline loaded on the jet and it is a *beautiful* thing. Living/sleeping quarters, conference room, comm suite, galley, complete shower/lav facilities: even Jake Benscoter looks special coming out of the module. And let me be clear about this...it is not a Gucci DV kit.

We have made our jets safer this winter by working with on-base resources and putting new JA/ATT boxes on board. These are functional and built smart. Smaller than the old, outdated boxes, all required pieces are stored inside so that accountability and access to equipment is much easier.

McGuire has been aggressively refurbishing our jets under the Glossy Eagle program. Kudos to our maintenance personnel for doing their homework and producing some of

the finest "fresh off the assembly line" looking aircraft I have ever seen. They very nearly match the ones we picked up at Long Beach.

Let me run down the list of key personnel in the 2nd Air Refueling Squadron. Note everyone is a key person here; we can't legislate high morale (can you imagine some didn't want to come here?) but each person is needed to make things happen. So here goes for the 1995 list. 

Hello from the world of ACC. We are the 22 ARS, that little known unit at Mt. Home AFB, Id. We are part of the 366 WG, the Air Force's Air Intervention Composite Wing.

Out on the road I've been asked many times what it is like here. The base is geographically located in a high desert (tumble weeds, whistle pigs and dust storms). The mountains are about an hour and a half away by car. The summers are very arid (a dry heat, so I'm told) and the winters can be very cold (in the subzero's for weeks at a time).

If you like the "Big City" attitude in a small town, you would like it here. Mt. Home is approximately 10 miles from the base and it doesn't offer alot in the form of amenities. It has a couple of grocery stores, car dealerships and restaurants. The nearest city is Boise and it offers most everything you could want with a "Small Town" attitude. It is about 60 miles from the base.

The mission pace here is fast and furious. We have 7 tankers and 8 aircrews with 2500 flying hours. Scheduling, Training Flight, Stan/Eval and DONO make up 4 of the 8 crews. We find ourselves participating in every form of exercise imaginable; Sharp Shooters, Long Shots, CFT's and Flags. We're on the road any where from 30 to 90 days a year, most of those in conjunction with the fore mentioned exercises. In Addition, we find we have a large role as the "ACC Airliner" providing CDV transportation.

SUBJECT: Boom Signal Input

- 1. This letter contains Boom Signal inputs from the CCTS Schoolhouse--the 55th Air Refueling Squadron.
- 2. Greetings from your new CCTS squadron at Altus AFB, Oklahoma. What a year we have had. We stood the squadron up on 10 October 94 while we taught small classes at both Castle and Altus. By April, we were up and running full speed in Oklahoma and Castle didn't have an aircraft on the ramp. Bummer. But, the boom's here did a great job modifying the syllabus and procedures for Altus, developing local policies and guidelines and working together to teach one another.
- 3. Teaching each other was important. We took 40 percent of the instructors from Castle to Altus, kept 14 who were stationed at Altus in the operational squadrons, and recruited several from each AMC base. Then, barely 90 days after standup, the AETC IG arrived accompanied by Chief Dave Sharpe, Chief Roy Schufft, and SMSgt Mike Wetzel. "We're just here to help." The boom shop, as you would expect, captured every "commendable" rating in our squadron. In any case, by April we were on track, up to speed, and ready for students.
- 4. Today, boom classes are completely full of bright, hard-working student boom operators who keep everyone busy and make everyone happy. We've condensed the course to seven flights and a check and so far its worked out. We seem to have more flexibility to recover lost training at Altus than we had at Castle and are able to fly students two days in a row if necessary to recover or conduct additional training. We're pretty happy with the status of training at Altus and hope to hear your thoughts and ideas. We made some changes to our methods and have made overthe-shoulder flights by supervisors a normal part of life. Changes include:
- a. Manual Form F's--Since some use the HP-41, some use the HP-200, and others use Sharp calculators, we worked with Chief Harris and determined the least common denominator to be manual calculations. So that's what students will know when they arrive. And boy can they do a manual Form F quickly!

- b. Pubs Bags--We determined that putting pubs bags in the troop seats may be OK in the field but it didn't teach a student much. So we teach the students to tie down pubs bags on the floor and learn how to use straps in different conditions. Students learn it well.
- c. Main Gear Down Locks The Dash One says to put these in a down lock holder on the forward bulkhead or tie them to the floor. (1-244) That's what we teach. We don't allow them under the galley.
- d. Disconnect--After disconnect, we teach the students to not raise the boom any more than 14 degrees or so (that's where you lose sight of it) except to avoid contacting the receiver. This gives them a target so they can see both the receiver and the boom simultaneously and keeps them from pulling up so hard they hit the bottom of the aircraft. (Yes, it happened.)
- e. Retraction--When in manual retract or when a student misses on a contact attempt, we teach to retract the boom to the stops. This technique eliminates whipping action caused by an extended boom in any abnormal condition and reduces the chance of damage. (Happened.)
- 5. AETC is still paying 100% of the cost of getting CCAF degrees for CCTS instructors. Everything is paid for: books, fees, tuition, parking, everything. In fact, two of our booms are going to school full time to complete their degree. Good deal. We're about 90% CCAF complete thanks to SMSgt Greg Durand and SSgt Joe Reed.
- 6. We keep current in the mobility business by going on roller runs and participating in exercises. SSgt Steve Schlinkert and SSgt Red Paullet are currently in Turkey teaching Turks the KC-135 business. The Turkish students completed initial qualification here and then their instructors took them to Turkey for six months of CCTS continuation/local orientation. Red and Steve will be replaced in October by MSgt Dalton Pratt and SSgt Dean Pickering. It's a tough life.
- 7. CCTS instructors continue the tradition of Castle with a strong boom union. We retired Dean Bakken in a ceremony that stunned the airlifters. Then we began a Boom Operator Liberation Army (BOLA) no-notice program and hospitality check for Altus Boom Operators and their families. Several BOLA's have been completed and many EQ's have been awarded. Then we held the first ever Boom Operator Combat Dining-In, the results of which are highly classified. We did, however, dub the C-5 CCTS the "Dumbo Squadron" that evening. They like to say that Altus is Jumbo Country. We asked them to tell us when their Mission Capable rate is over 40 percent. Dumbo Country. We recently renewed the Baby Boom wing pin-on ceremony after academics and immerse the students in boom operator traditions from the very beginning.

8. We'd like to acknowledge and publicly congratulate all Altus booms who were promoted this year.

Greetings from where it all STILL begins! This past year has been one of turmoil, excitement, leaving old friends, meeting new friends and adjusting to a very different part of the world. We have completed our move to Altus and believe me we were as surprised as anyone when the BOPTTs rolled into town completely disassembled on the back of a flat bed truck with little or no instructions on how to put them back into working order. Through the miracle of modern technology and a lot of corporate knowledge they were up and running in only one month. Speaking of the BOPTT, a trade study has been completed that recommends a complete refurbishing of the BOPTT to include an upgrade of visual and computer systems.

Many new changes have happened since our last input to the BOOM SIGNAL. The major change, which is most obvious, was the move from Castle to Altus. This not only involved a lot of effort and coordination, but also caused the loss of training for three entire classes. We still managed to put out 74 new Boomers since last August.

The Air Force was scheduled to break ground this summer on our new state-ofthe-art building, but like most projects the money was not available and had to be postponed until next year. The new facility will include all training under one roof (including simulators and BOPTTs). It will be over 64,000 square feet (compare this to the 15,000 square feet that was available at the Castle school house) of the most up to date equipment and material available. We are eagerly looking forward to enhancing our training program.

While on the subject of new, let me take this opportunity to introduce our current staff of Boom Operator instructors including two new hires.

These folks represent over 250 years of flying experience including 75,000 flying hours and 30,000 instructor hours.

The current proposal from our customer (the Air Force) is to conduct cargo loading training to the qualification level. This will include a complete course of academics and hands on training with a full size cargo loading trainer that is currently being procured from Davis Monthan AFB. In the interim the 97 AMW has agreed to provide us with an aircraft to conduct this training. 1. Greetings to all BOOM OPERATORS around the world from the MAINEiacs.

- 2. Here at Bangor our role in the Northeast Tanker Task Force is growing. We have become a 24 hour, 7 day a week operation. The Ops tempo as driven by the TTF, local air refueling requests, world wide air refueling and airlift tasking, ORI deployment, ATSO training deployments and a two week unit deployment to Mildenhall with five aircraft has us stretched very thin. We have two of Alaska's E- Models from their conversion to R-Models. This brings us up to 12 of our own tankers on the ramp. 48.6 % of our sorties flown between 1 Jan 95 and 31 May 95 required two booms. Coupled with seemingly endless new training requirements, the work load on our booms is tremendous. The traditional guardsman Booms have taken on a heavy schedule. We have no full time available tradition guardsman. 100% of them have full time civilian employment at this time. The technician/AGR force has the proverbial "full plate" plus they are stepping up to fill short notice taskings and cancellations. I am very fortunate to have a highly motivated boom shop which is still "covering the checks that the brave new AMC world is writing". I am immensely proud of the manner in which they have responded, but I can not expect them to maintain this level of participation long term. The Boom crew ratio problem simply has to be addressed and satisfactorily resolved.
- 3. Please stop by the Boom shop to say "Hi" when you are passing through or TDY at Bangor. We can fix most problems you may have (excluding financial and love life). We can provide directions and transportation to a quick bite to eat if you're just passing through. We can provide local area maps with routes to your favorite activities highlighted for those who are TDY here. Ask me about Governors, huge amounts of food at enlisted per diem prices. (You will get the full per diem rate at Bangor but maybe can use the savings at the next stop if you are on base.) Occasionally we may be able to break free to help solve the world's problems over lunch.
- 4. We look forward to meeting those we haven't yet had the pleasure to meet and saying hello again to old friends both here at Bangor and on the road.



- 1. Greetings and salutations from the land of "cheeseheads", good beer, and the future home of the International Bratwurst Hall of Fame. As host of this years Inflight Refueling Program Manager's Conference, we hope to show some of our fellow booms why Milwaukee is the place where the saying, "party 'til the cows come home", was made famous. all right, none of us knows what that really means, but many of us have gone home with some on occasion.
- The 128 Air Refueling Group has experienced another year of non-stop flying activity. Needless to say, our maintenance personnel are working round-the-clock to keep it all together and allow us to meet our training requirements and operational commitments. Believe me, we're not whining because we know that other units are suffering under the same burdens. Although, now some "rocket scientist" General comes along with the brilliant idea that as an additional mission the Guard and Reserve KC-135s (only R models:) should take over the tanker task force at Mildenhall. Not just for a week or month at a time, but as a year round commitment. Ah, but that's another story as we'll all soon find out.

SSgt Warren Faurot



SUBJ: BOOM SIGNAL

It's that time of year again for our yearly input to the Boom Signal. The TDY and flying pace here at RAF Mildenhall is still the same, and we've been invited to participate in the concept of ITUD. So if you drop in on us and no ones around (which is not unusual) try France or Turkey or Italy or Crete or Egypt or Spain, let's just say points east of Mildenhall. The plan is to outfit the vehicles with UHF/VHF radios and tool boxes to make the 909th truly autonomous. The trucks will be loaded onto a pallet and be the last thing on and the first thing off the aircraft at our deployed location. Now that is a REAL quality initiative!



In addition, we have convinced all of our customer units that it would be in their best interest to fund the conformal cargo bins from Air Cadillac. At the beginning of the new fiscal year, the wing will begin acquiring the bins and the ancillary equipment to go with them at a cost of nearly \$400,000. This will increase our ability to deploy while decreasing the number of airframes required.

The boom operator section recently went through a reorganization which took the best of both the flight and pool system. We have booms operating in capacities that just a few years ago were unthinkable. Booms supervising, organizing, and rating other booms. Who would have thought it? It was a long time in coming but our troops have stood up to the challenge in splendid style. Was there ever any doubt?

It's just this type of initiative that makes this unit great. It possesses some of the sharpest booms in the field, and as proof I offer our promotion rates. Our mission diversity demands excellence from our operators and they deliver on a daily basis. I'm proud to be associated with them and look forward to helping the 909th boom operators continue to achieve the outstanding results which they have become accustomed.

SRA Joe Gellis: Looking to be our next instructor candidate came to us from Robbins has a real wealth of knowledge and experience we're looking for some big things from Joe.


