It's hard to believe I've been here for a year now since PCSing from Scott AFB. I never thought I'd end up at the schoolhouse, be it at Castle or Altus AFB. The town folk here are super friendly, in fact I've never been to a base where the town throws a welcome feast once a quarter and provides great entertainment to boot. What's more important is I'm surrounded by a select group of professionals from all four airframes. Truly some of America's finest; it's a humbling experience.

One of the neat things about having the CCTS at Altus AFB is, we get to start new traditions here, while not forgetting the old. This is definitely a team effort at the Mobility Schoolhouse consisting of FlightSafety Services Corporation, the 55 ARS/CCTS, 97 TRS/CFIC, and 97 OSS.

Let me fill you in on what's been happening over this past year and provide you with some statistics. I have 67 authorized instructor boom operator slots divided up as follows: 55 ARS, 45; 97 TRS, 14; and the 97 OSS, 8.

We reached a low of 12 booms short this year, reaching it's peak (or should I say valley) during the summer months, and we didn't skip a beat. The instructors from all three squadrons pulled together like booms always do, and got it done, no lost training. I DO NOT want the instructor force to go through that again, and yes it was painful.

We are getting better now, thanks to all the squadron ops supers who've sent me a terrific group of young instructors. I can tell you've sent me some of your best. We've welcomed eight new IBOs over the last five months and have six more inbound through the end of spring. On the flip side, I have some great IBOs hungry and ready to return to the field and face new challenges.

So please, keep the schoolhouse in mind, if you're thinking about career enhancement. Our promotion statistics are usually double the Air Force average. Altus is the place to be, just look at our promotion numbers, consistently high over the last four years.

We produced 144 new boom operators in FY 97 for active-duty, guard, reserve, and international customers. We expect to produce slightly more than 150 this year. In CFIC, we produced 43 new instructor booms for the three components, and expect to produce 101 (Wow!) this year, including some international IBOs.

On the negative side we eliminated 11 boom students at Altus AFB for the following reasons: academic, judicial, medical, self elimination, and unit recall. I promise to do my best to insure we send the units quality booms, this is a responsibility I regard as priority one, as does my OG/CC; keeping in mind that we're not a one mistake Air Force and nobody is perfect.

Our state-of-the-art CLT is just about complete. Let me tell you it was a sight to behold seeing a KC-135 on that flat bed tractor-trailer. Additionally, the new KC-135 training facility to the tune of \$10.5M, is also nearing completion. What a campus we are going to have, the only thing we need now is the BOSS, short for boom operator system simulator.

Finally, let me make a plug for the next (19th Annual, 2nd at Altus) Boom Operators Symposium scheduled for 17-19 April 97. Last year's was a rousing success, over 350 showed up, we're hoping for 500 this year, so get approval from your OG/CC and get it on your quarterly schedules NOW! Come see the schoolhouse grow! Your Heritage!

CFIC BOOM OPERATORS



Greetings to all boom operators worldwide from T-tail country. Altus is home to the C-5, C-141, C-17 and, oh, by the way, the KC-135 school houses.

Changes continue to shape all that we do, as I'm sure everyone out there is familiar with as well. Since the T-tailers don't have a CFIC, they still aren't sure what we do or what to do with CFIC. So for now, we are still at Altus and upgrading candidates. CFIC is supposed to get a new squadron designation, although no one really knows when this will happen. We will be changing from the 97th TRS to the 54th ARS. What's another patch change when you've already done it four times in the past five years and never changed jobs?

Checkrides given here at CFIC are here to stay. Active duty R model and requested Guard checks are the norm. This seems to be working well and does help units by getting a "finished" instructor instead of having to fly and check them when they get home. We know how busy all the units are with deployments and TDY's. Don't let the AETC patch fool you, the evaluation you get here will not be any harder than the one you would get at home. That may be good or bad. The Guard short course is still alive, although we don't know for how long. The short course, originally designed for pilots only, has it's enemies in AETC. CFIC has changed a lot in the past few years. We now have set scenario's that are predetermined and supplied to the candidate before flight training begins. Candidates receive a guide that lists specifics of the scenario for each of the four sorties, goals for each phase of ground and flight instruction, and goals for briefings and critiques. This standardizes the training each candidate gets and lets them fairly prepare and anticipate methods of instruction. Instruction is the focus of every sortie. Of course, associated directives, aircraft systems, amplified checklist knowledge, training folders, as well as weight and balance are the vehicles we use to practice instruction. Pre-attendance training for CFIC always seems to be a problem but is getting better. What we would like to see is pre-attendance training focusing on is briefings, critiques, amplified checklist knowledge, and weight and balance, NOT practice role playing.

"FLY THE AIRCRAFT!"

Flight Safety

Greetings from the Civilian Boom Operator Instructors. I'd like to fill you in on what has transpired at Flight Safety Altus since the last Boom signal was printed. The proposed completion date for our new school house is March 9, 1998. This new building will house two Boom Simulators (BOPTTs), four pilot Operational Flight Trainers (OFTs), classrooms, offices, curriculum development and maintenance. The new building has 64,000 square feet of floor space compared to the 15,000 square feet that we had in the old 4017th building at Castle.

Additionally, a state-of-the-art, 1.3 million dollar building will house the new full-size cargo loading trainer. On September 22, 1997 a KC-135A, minus the wings and tail section departed Davis-Monthan AFB, Arizona on the back of a flat bed truck. The truck and fuselage measured 19 feet tall and 105 feet long! The driver (who was the best we've ever seen) had to avoid all highway overpasses due to the height of this cargo. After four days of travel along a very creative route the "Load" finally arrived at Altus. The news media coverage was extensive with many pictures taken from both the ground and the air. The trainer will be used for student hands-on training to include floor loading, palletized operations and cargo evaluations. After successful evaluation completion the student will be cargo loading qualified when they report to their gaining unit.

After waiting many years for a full-size cargo loading trainer it is only fitting to give a brief history of the aircraft.

The New and Improved Air Refueling Boom is for Foreign Military Sales to the KC-135 foreign customers. The boom is an improvement directed towards reliability and maintainability. Initial flight testing was conducted in August, 1997, at Pease International Airport with the New Hampshire Air Guard. The preliminary test results showed some handling difficulties at the lower airspeeds with A-10 and C-130 receivers but, there was improved handling with the C-5 receiver. The handling difficulties are from the increased weight of the boom due to the manufacturing design of the outer structural tube. The outer structural tube is of a single piece extrusion as opposed to the current riveted segments currently in use. This design weighs approximately 180 pounds more but has maintenance access doors to key areas versus having to remove several panels to accomplish the same task. Boeing has made several improvements to the design, aerodynamically, and appears to have improved the low speed handling qualities in free air. Testing is scheduled to resume at the Arizona Air Guard facilities in February.



Greetings from Hampton Roads and home of Air Combat Command Headquarters. It has been a very busy year in ACC. Some have asked why ACC is still mandating a special air refueling category for the B-2 at night. Well the answer is pretty simple. We are still experiencing some significant damage as a result of boom contacts outside the receptacle during night operations. In May, I conducted a survey to determine if there was still a need to retain this special EC/KC-135 night air refueling qualification for B-2 aircraft. The survey involved PACAF, USAFE, AETC, AFRC, ANG, AMC and ACC units resulting in the recommendation to extend the current restrictions. Continued emphasis on special training and air refueling directives was also a recommendation from a KC-135/B-2 inflight mishap investigation board. We will readdress this issue again next year.

The mission is going to the Navy TACAMO so beginning this summer, some of those crewmembers will be coming back to AMC and out to the units. Treat them right. 
SSgt Yvonne Sell, Reservist: Our newest boom operator. Busy getting her fully mission qualified.

We as a wing, have begun the process of regaining control of our destiny by reasserting ourselves as leaders of the wing boom force. From program managers rating their flight supervisors to divesting ourselves of First Sergeant duties, we are attempting to provide the young enlisted aviator the true mentorship/leadership he or she deserves. We would like to see this effort applied throughout AMC, beginning with the wear of the Boom Operator's patch. With the Year of the Enlisted well underway, the opportunity to regain those symbols that define who we are, has never been better. The hostile takeover is history...it's time to see a resurgence of our heritage and to write a new chapter for our legacy. Remember...there is strength in numbers!

Approximately 600 of the KC-135's will be modified in the next couple of years. Active Duty, Guard and Reserve will all have modified aircraft. 

Howdy! Things are still pretty good here in sunny San Antonio. We've been keeping busy over the past year with various things effecting the boom operator career field. We are just about done with the KC-135 Cargo Loading Trainer. We have a brand new building (1.3 million dollars) and a KC-135 fuselage that we will turn over to the contractors (FlightSafety) sometime in Feb 98. This has been the longest project I have ever undertaken (4 years) and I will be glad to see it come to and end. Ironically the fuselage is from the last KC-135A model to leave Castle. We originally had this aircraft scheduled to become the trainer and were going to disassemble it at Altus in the summer of 94 (except several O-6s got involved and they decided they did not want a fuselage hulk sitting on their ramp) and it was diverted to the bone yard. So 3 and ½ years later it arrives on a flatbed trailer, and went right into our new building which has 2 C-141 fuselages (minus wings and tails) sitting within sand wedge distance. Just amazing how much help O-6s (not to be confused with Colonels) can be. The next big project on the burner is acquisition of 2 Boom Operator Weapons System Trainers (BOWST). We have the R&D and prototype money (9.5 million) in the 2000 POM and the 2nd BOWST to be delivered in 2001 (4.5 million). The folks at AMC hope to piggyback on our initiative and buy 2 BOWST's to be utilized for continuation training. The pilot community is looking at being able to accomplish approximately 50% of their training events in simulators. Their fear is that in the continuation training world boom operators may actually drive flying hours. The senior boom leadership is working to determine just how much training is really necessary and can we accomplish these in a true simulator. Our goal within AETC is to provide the most qualified graduate that we can. We hope that with the BOWST we will graduate people sooner with all categories of receivers signed off. (This is only possible if we get the quality of simulator that will accomplish this and it is my highest priority). Chief Glast, Chief Hubbard, and myself are committed to reducing the burden on the units and this should help.

Another initiative that we have been throwing around for a while and are finally going to accomplish is the development of a basic boom operator course. This course would be the lead-in course prior to going to either the 135 or 10 and would be where the AFSC is awarded. Initial thoughts are that this course will cover all of the basics such as air refueling procedures, terps, weight and balance, systems, hazmat, etc. etc.. Hopefully this course will eliminate much of what is taught in the weapons system courses now. By developing this course we eliminate the KC-10 initial qual booms from having to go to the KC-135 course and reduce their training time, and this also sets us up for the future tanker and not having to teach redundant subjects with that aircraft. This also lets us screen individuals further prior to placing them in an aircraft, just another opportunity to ensure we don't waste training dollars. Hopefully once everything is aligned and the bugs worked out the training time for the 135 will not increase, but that will have to be seen.

I am still working to ensure that the schoolhouse has sufficient instructors to accomplish their mission. Here recently we've been pretty creative since we don't want to force people to move to Altus simply because they are the high time person on station. I still believe that a volunteer is a much better instructor than a non-volunteer and hope that we can keep noting but volunteers at the school house. If you do wish to volunteer please call me at DSN 487-4463 and I will be happy to talk to you. I can truthfully say that those who have left Altus have gotten the assignment that they wanted. It may not have been when they wanted it, but as we all know timing is everything. Let me also assure you that our DP folks and SMSgt Warner at AFPC, Chief Glast, and myself do everything we can to get people the assignment of their choice, and if you are willing to wait for an opening it will probably happen. But do not expect to leave 3 years to the date of your arrival and go to the base of your choice.

If you are ever in the area, Ted and I are usually around somewhere please call and we will show you the sights.

The second Boom Operator Trainer (BOT) will be operational at McGuire in March. It's looking good. Refueling an F-16 at dusk over the desert looks real. The only thing missing is a box lunch. Altus is looking to upgrade the KC-135 BOPTT to something similar, and AMC would then buy two more to put at two of the wings for training.

We are still working on a Basic Boom Operator course. We will be ironing out the details in the next few months, and

are hoping to have it on line by January, 1999.

We may be making some headway with Kelly on 791's. In FY 99, the money is there to put a reader on all tankers, and some kind of IR transmitter on every DOD airplane so tail number info is recorded automatically. Let's hope it works.

We're still running into problems with HAZMAT. Be aware of your documentation and what you have on board. I've been here for a year now, and am actually getting used to the pace. But there's still a lot more to do than there is time to do it. I'll get to it eventually, but be patient.

SMSgt Jim Eden, HQ AMC/DOV: DSN 576-5305. The transition to here from DOV at 15th was fairly simple with respect to DOV issues, however, the staffing is killing me. Parker Hannifin has re-engaged the AF to continue testing the independent disconnect capabilities of their nozzle. We just finished shutting them off because of continued float-out problems and the receiver community cancelling A/Rs if the tanker had the IBN. We'll see if they have made any progress. We are in the final coord process for the new -9. No changes for the (K)A-9 community, we just added the A-9 to our (K)A-9. We thought it wasteful to maintain two separate -9s.

Last but not least...the "Boom Signal". There seemed to be a lack of time?? Interest?? or something from the boom community when I was taking inputs for OUR annual newsletter. In the larger sense this was very disturbing to me because I feel, NO I know we are the closest nit career field in the AF. As I put the signal together several of the other enlisted career fields (life support, loads, FE, etc.) even the officers complimented us on the signal and "BOOM UNION". They know the strength we have and some have felt the wrath of the UNION. This really made me feel good. Please do not let this union fall. The booms before us fought hard to get what we enjoy today, and we must continue to work hard so those who follow, can enjoy the same. 




Boom cross training from transportation in Fairchild. After driving aircrew around for so long, I guess he wants to be driven around for awhile.

I recommend placing a copy of the CFETP in each individuals training folder OR somewhere else as long as a copy exists for each individual. No annotations in the CFETP are required except for a name on or in the booklet (Part II, Section A, Attachment 1 provides a spot)


